BEGINNING OUR 150TH YEAR OF MINISTRY

Hello Friends,

Just a couple of weeks ago we marked the 149th anniversary of our church. We are so grateful that a small congregation gathered on the banks of the Poudre River on Sunday, August 25, 1872 and formed the First Presbyterian Church of Fort Collins—a year before Fort Collins was officially a city and four years before Colorado was admitted to the Union as the 38th state.

As we begin our 150th year of ministry and mission in our community, we begin a yearlong celebration of our shared legacy, give thanks for our current vibrant church family and look ahead to see where God is leading us into our future. The working theme for this sesquicentennial (a word you'll hear often this next year!) will be, "A Heart for the City: Celebrating our First 150 Years."

While many of the celebrations will take place on and closer to our actual anniversary next August, our 150th Planning Team is already at work on a variety of inspiring, interactive projects that will provide ways for you to share your own memories, thanksgivings and dreams for FPC.

We're also looking forward to some significant events this coming year, including our music ministry's world premiere of composer Craig Courtney's "Divine Encounter" on Sunday, November 7 (see article on page 4). Stay tuned for more information

I also want to acknowledge here, pivoting a bit, that our plans for this fall, including our anniversary plans, have been modified in light of higher COVID numbers in our community. We continue to monitor updates from our County and State Health Departments, medical and public health professionals in Fort Collins and colleagues at churches around town and across the country. We know that vaccines are safe and effective and that meeting in spaces with larger air capacity and airflow is safer for everyone, too. We are fortunate to have both high vaccination rates and several large rooms to meet in, including our sanctuary, as well as great outdoor spaces.

With this in mind, we are working to maintain as many opportunities for inperson worship, fellowship, small groups, children's and youth ministry, and service as possible. We are also

continuing to expand what we offer online for those who feel safer joining in from home these days. When we consider each other's overall health and well-being, we seek to balance the value to your spiritual, emotional, relational, and intellectual health that FPC worship, ministries, and programs offer to you alongside the value of safeguarding your physical health.

As always, if you have questions, concerns or feedback for me or any of our staff, officers, or leaders, please do not hesitate to reach out. We know there are a variety of perspectives and an ever-evolving body of research and realities that are moving with us through this season. 
Our fall sermon series looks at three dimensions of our faith:

DIVINE ENCOUNTER

A WORLD PREMIERE MUSICAL PERFORMANCE





Have you ever attended a world premiere? Many consider such events as once-in-a-lifetime experiences. First Presbyterian Church Music Ministry invites you to participate as, for the very first time anywhere in the world, they present an extraordinary choral commission in the Sanctuary on Sunday, November 7, 2021.

Divine Encounter is a three-part choral composition by distinguished composer Craig Courtney. Marvin Crawford will direct the Sanctuary Choir (including former members and guest performers), organist Joe McConanthy, and a stringed instrument ensemble. With texts drawn from the Old Testament, the words and music artfully express the compelling relationship our God initiates and draws us into—a divine encounter, marked by Invitation, Offering, and Blessing.

Why is this so special for us?

This commissioned piece celebrates the lifetime music ministries of Marvin L. Crawford, Director of Music and the Arts, and Joe McConathy, Organist. What's more, it is a fitting celebration

in the 150th anniversary year of First Presbyterian Church. Marv and Joe have led us in joyful, meaningful worship on countless Sundays.

When will this happen?

On Sunday, November 7, *Divine Encounter* will be performed as part of our morning worship service(s). We will communicate specific details as we get closer to the date. For now, please keep this date in mind and plan to invite your friends and family for this premiere.

Who is the composer?

Craig Courtney is considered one of the foremost sacred choral music composers in the world. He has focused his professional career in church music ministry both in the United States and Europe. An accomplished pianist, choral director, and composer, Courtney has published more than two hundred choral pieces and currently serves as both a staff composer and editor with Beckenhorst Press of Columbus, Ohio. He will be joining us for this premiere!

How did this come to be?

This idea was envisioned in 2018 and championed by members of our Sanctuary Choir. Postponed twice by the reality of COVID, we believe November 7 is God's timing. The Edward D. Anderson Choral Scholars Fund, a generous donor-friend to the music ministry of our church, commissioned Divine Encounter. The fund was created in 2011 in honor of Edward D. Anderson (1916-2014), who had a stellar career in choral music at CSU as well as in several Fort Collins churches. He was also the founder of the Fort Collins Chamber Singers. Anderson was the father of FPC member Karlin Gray and her brother, Donald Anderson.

Mark your calendars for Sunday, November 7, 2021. Spread the word of this wonderful event to your family and friends. And please come to help celebrate the lifetime of service of both Marv Crawford and Joe McConathy.

No doubt, we all feel very fortunate to live in Fort Collins and Larimer County. We can engage in various cultural and arts activities, make use of an extensive system of trails and bike paths, and enjoy many other amenities. However, for many in our community, these positive features are offset by obstacles to overcome. Luckily, many committed, caring organizations within the Fort Collins area are dedicated to addressing these obstacles. This fall, Midweek eXperience (MX) at FPC will focus on these issues and organizations.

MX is a Wednesday night gathering that was created to deepen our connection to God and to each other. Typically, MX includes dinner, childcare, and classes for adults. This fall, MX's Fort Collins Issues Forum will be held in the Sanctuary each Wednesday evening from September 15-November 17, 6:00-7:00 p.m. Each week will address a different issue confronting those who live in Fort Collins. The MX series will open with a presentation from ISAAC (The Interfaith Solidarity and Accompaniment Coalition). They focus on issues centering on immigration, including assisting DACA and Dreamer candidates in working their way through the legal aspects of the process leading to citizenship. The following weeks will include presentations by:

- Christina Taylor from the Early Childhood Council of Larimer County will discuss problems that families face trying to find affordable childcare
- Rev. David Williams, who will speak about the work of the newly formed Our Commitment to Self and Society group, which addresses issues of racial equity
- The executive director of Homeward Alliance, David Rout, will explain the problems confronting the homeless in our community
- Dr. Blanche Hughes, the Vice President for Student Affairs at Colorado State, will discuss how CSU is working to address issues of diversity and equity on campus, and
- Police Chief Jeffrey Swoboda will discuss topics related to our criminal justice system

Other evenings will consider the availability of mental health services, the high cost of housing in our area, and the difficulties facing the Hispanic community. In each case, we will be finding out about the organization's concerns, their successes in addressing the problems they find in Fort Collins, and how we can support their work.

So, please mark your calendars now, and plan to join us for fun, fellowship,

and the opportunity to learn about the work of the many dedicated organizations that seek to make Fort Collins and Larimer County a genuinely great place to live for everyone.

NOTE: No dinner will be offered this fall. Class begins at 6:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary and will also be livestreamed from our website.

This has been a year and a half of COVID detours. To safely host VBS, we planned it outside and reserved a pavilion at Fossil Creek Park. We scaled back to three consecutive evenings. Limited in the number of people we could have, we did not advertise to the outer community. As a result, we were a small but totally wonderful group of 10 kiddos and 15 adults and youth.

It is hard to describe the charm of those three nights. We were able to do all of the activities together rather than rotate stations. We had gathering and table time (where we discussed the lessons and themes more in-depth). Then we all went to play games on the lawn. It was hot enough so that the games included lots of water play. Getting a water-filled sponge squeezed out over my head was a highlight! Hot and thirsty, we had a snack and then did crafts together before our closing time. Our service project

was to make squares for a quilt to give to a Habitat family. Although the two hours went by fast, it felt relaxed and fun, like a big family get-together. I am so grateful to all of the kids, Kelly and Lily Regan, and all of the volunteers and donors that made our VBS detour possible!

Next summer, we hope to turn the church into a castle and have a hundred "knights" filling our halls for a week. It will be fun, exciting, and meaningful. It will be totally different from the relaxed time we had together this summer, not better, not worse — just different. Still, I will cherish the memories of this summer's unexpected detour.



THE WORD SOURCE



IF I COULD ASK GOD ANYTHING: awesome Bible answers for curious kids, Kathryn Slattery. Nashville: Thomas Nelson 2006. 207 pp.

If I Could Ask God Anything is an excellent new book in our church library. The author Kathryn Slattery has gleaned questions from youth in Greenwich and New Canaan, Connecticut, and incorporated them into this book. (New Canaan, where Rev. Dr. Scott Herr is pastor, will ring a bell for some of us in Fort Collins.) I call this book Theology 101 because of its straightforward, easy-tounderstand answers and eternal truths to theological questions.

As I read this book, my mind went back some decades when an elementary child, who evidentially had concentrated on the worship service, stopped me on the stairwell. He asked, "Miss Jane, does God really have an actual ghost living with Him?" I answered as best I could among a rushing crowd of children and then followed up that week with a more thoughtfully written statement for his age group. How I wish I had had Kathryn Slattery's book to have shared with him as it takes up that same

question along with others as who is the Holy Spirit, how does the Holy Spirit help me, and what are the fruits of the Holy Spirit.

Other theological questions discussed in the book include God, Jesus, The Bible, Christianity, Prayer, the Church, Christian Seasons and Holidays, Being a Christian Here and Now, and Being a Christian Forever and Ever.

In my opinion, two areas on which one might want to seek further advice are the devil and hell.

If I Could Ask God Anything could be an excellent book for use in communicants' classes. For those who want to think through theological matters again, Kathryn Slattery's book would provide a refreshing review for any adult age. For those seeking further advanced study, check out Alister McGrath's books.


